

Parents' evenings provide the opportunity for you to see your child's class teachers and find out how you can support your child at subject level in achieving academic excellence.



 - Moving to early lunch to ensure you have all the time you need to rest and refresh before an afternoon exam.




How to revise using YouTube videos:



- 2. Recap the method for answering the questions from your exercise books.
- 3. Time yourself using your phones for each question.
- 4. Annotate your responses for where you have followed the method.

How to revise English Literature

Flashcards – RST & Literature key quotations




How to create flashcards:

- 1. Choose a Literature text to revise.
- 2. Choose a theme or character.
- 3. Write down a key quotation for the theme or character on one side of the flashcard.
- 4. On the back, write links to context and what it suggests about the theme or character.

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How to revise English Literature

Creating mind maps – character and themes



How to create mind-maps:

- **1.** Choose a literature text.
- 2. Choose a theme or character and write them in the middle of the paper.
- 3. The create branches with things associated with the theme of character.
- 4. Then create more branches with things associated with those things.
- 5. Add in links to context and key quotations.

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How to revise English Language

Reading different text types – applying R4M and identify PAFF



How to revise using different text types:

- **1.** Find different text types e.g. articles, short stories.
- Read through them and 2. apply reading for meaning.
- Look up any vocabulary 3. you are unsure of.
- Then, identify the Purpose, 4. Audience, Form and Formality.

GCSE Mathematics

- We follow the AQA specification for GCSE Mathematics.
- This is a two year course
- Students will follow either the foundation or higher tier
- Both tiers will allow for students to gain a grade 4 or above.

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What should your child be doing to maximise their success in mathematics?

Equipment

Pen, pencil, ruler, calculator, protractor, compass

Homework

All students have access to SPARX – an online platform used to learn, recall and revise all powerful knowledge of mathematics. They should be using this for homework, and their own independent study. We have homework surgeries every Thursday afterschool.



What can you do for your child?

- Practice is important in mathematics. We use SPARX as our main platform, but there are so many more out there. Maths Genie, Corbett maths, Seneca
- QLA each student has been given their QLA from their previous assessment.
- Revision guides each student has been provided with a revision guide and flash cards (if they have requested them)

How to study Mathematics

Identify the issues

Notes

- Maths is a practical subject
- Never just read your notes
- You need to do questions!

Past Exam Questions

- Make a list of your mistakes
- Write out the correct solutions, don't just read them
- If you don't understand a question, ask for help!
- Go back a few days later and do the questions on your mistake list again.

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Be strategic and get support

Be strategic

- Sometimes do whole past papers; sometimes focus on one topic
- Have a day you focus on your least favorite topic.

Homework

- Make sure it's done
- Go back and fix your mistakes
- Don't ignore the ones you get wrong.

Get support

- Attend homework surgeries
- Ask your teacher for help
- Use SPARX

Help yourself remember

Test yourself

- Do past papers without your notes
- See what you really know
- Redo your incorrect questions a few days later
- See if you have improved.


Space your practice

- An hour of study done often throughout the year is much better than cramming at the end
- You will remember more this way.

What makes a successful mathematician?

- Students who can problem solve
- Students who can connect mathematical concepts to the real world
- Students who can work independently to succeed using the examination question level analysis RAG sheets
- Students who read carefully, spotting key details in questions.
